In 2013 the month of February was recognized as Mahina 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, Hawaiian language month, to celebrate and encourage the use of the Hawaiian language. Like most indigenous languages worldwide, the Hawaiian language faced a significant decline due to colonization.

Over the past 40 years, Hawaiian language immersion schools have revitalized the language, growing a new generation of mānaleo, native speakers with Hawaiian as their first language. The resurgence of the Hawaiian language and culture is primarily due to the Hawaiian Renaissance.



I am honored to continue serving the County of Honolulu as the Councilmember for District IV. I also acknowledge and respect the generous volunteerism, dedication, and advocacy of the six neighborhood boards within District IV that inform and work with my office on issues impacting our island home.

IN STREET PEDESTRIAN SCHOOL CROSSING SIGNS

We are pleased to report that Department of Transportation Services (DTS) recently approved our requests, on behalf of the Hawai'i Kai Neighborhood Board, to install in Street Pedestrian Crossing (ISPC) signs to deter speeding and increase pedestrian safety at the following two locations:

Kamilo'iki Elementary School Hawai'i Kai Drive at Ahukini Street DFM Paint & Sign Work Order (PSWO) #19980

Haha'ione Elementary School Haha'ione Street at Pepe'ekeo Street DFM PSWO #27068

DTS submitted the above referenced work orders to Department of Facility Maintenance (DFM) for installation of the signs, which may take several more months to complete. RESOLUTION 22-253, CD1 REQUESTING ENFORCEMENT OF CITY'S SIT-LIE ORDINANCES NEAR SCHOOLS

At the January full Council Meeting, the Council voted to approve Resolution 22-253, CD1.

This Resolution requests the Administration to enforce the sit-lie and stored property ordinances on City sidewalks and public properties located near preschools as well as elementary, intermediate, middle, secondary, and high schools, in order to ensure the full, free, and unobstructed passage of students and other pedestrians to these schools. The Resolution does not expand the laws, but rather asks for enforcement in these particular areas.

The Resolution also requests that the Administration collaborate with other City agencies to provide a written plan on how this could be accomplished within 90 days.

SHOWER IMPROVEMENTS BEGIN AT KAIMANA BEACH

We are happy to announce that due to the community's advocacy and funds that we inserted into the budget, a new shower is being constructed at Kaimana Beach.

The new shower will be located further mauka of the existing shower, in the grassed area on the eastside of the park between the Waikīkī War Memorial Natatorium and Kaimana Beach Hotel. This project also includes the demolition of the existing, double-head shower. However, recognizing the popularity of this beach and its existing shower facility, the demolition of the current shower is not scheduled until the new shower is completed.

The new shower will include three shower heads and one foot wash, all timed, with an additional drinking fountain, and concrete walkway installed. The project will also include installation of additional shower infrastructure, such as: a concrete pad, pervious pavers around the shower, piping, fittings, and a sediment catch basin.

The \$478,800 construction contract for this project was awarded to Site Engineering, Inc.

The project is expected to be completed in summer 2023.

COMMUNITY TRAFFIC SAFETY SURVEY

In consideration of the 117 lives that were lost on our roadways in 2022, the Hawai'i State Department of Transportation (HDOT) would like to hear from the public regarding traffic safety-oriented enforcement, infrastructure, and public awareness through a Community Traffic Safety Survey.

Information collected from the survey will help HDOT dedicate resources to communities that are greatly impacted by either traffic safety concerns or need additional resources and materials. This survey will be open for responses until December 31, 2023.

RESOLUTION 22-290 RELATING TO WAIKĪKĪ SURF RACKS

At the .January Full Honolulu City Council Meeting, the Council voted to approve Resolution 22-290.

I introduced this Resolution in December in response to many of your requests to relocate the City-owned surf racks in Waikīkī, also known as the Kūhiō Beach Surfboard Lockers. Not only is Hawai'i the birthplace of surfing, but this facility served many avid surfers, including senior citizens and disabled surfers, who could then store and easily access their boards for a monthly fee.

Tenants and community members expressed dismay after two fires in 2020 and 2021 that completely damaged the Waikiki surf racks. Both fires were set by arsonists, and the City had repaired and refurbished the Kūhiō Beach Surfboard Lockers immediately after the first fire only to see the entire facility damaged by a second fire in 2021.

The Resolution asks the City Administration to work cooperatively with community stakeholders to relocate these surfboard lockers so that this recreational facility could continue to serve the surfing community.
