Panel: Leveraging Resources to Support County Functions with Innovative Financial Technology

This panel gave attendees a clear look into managing money or liquidity. With money changing rapidly, knowing how to handle and use cash is very important. The workshop aimed to teach participants better ways to handle money and find new ways to earn.

Main Points from the Workshop:

The discussion covered a number of important topics, including:

- 1. **Understanding Cash Flow:** predicting how much money comes in and goes out, ensuring there's always enough on hand.
- 2. **Testing for Risks:** checking if there are any weak spots or risks in how money is managed.
- 3. **Working with Banks:** having a good relationship with banks, especially when interest rates change.

The workshop also highlighted the use of new technology to help manage money better. This is especially useful today when considering factors such as rising costs, budget issues, helping workers on the frontline, and funding community projects.

About the Speaker:

Garrett Macdonald led the workshop. He's been with a company called three+one since 2015 and works with public groups to help them manage and save money. He studied at St. John Fisher College and has a degree in finance and a master's in business. He's also written on money matters and has a special certificate from MIT about using technology in business.

- Dee Morikawa: Dee's journey began with the local Parks & Recreation department.
 Since 2011, she's been part of Hawaii's House of Representatives, holding significant leadership roles.

Program

The session delved deep into how strategic relationships could lead to safeguarding natural habitats and promoting responsible land use.

Main Points from the Workshop:

- Susan Veazey: A seasoned professional, Susan's role as a Project Manager at the Western Regional Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation has been instrumental. She has a rich history of service, including with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.
- Lena Fowler: A trailblazer as the first Native American Chair for Coconino County's Board of Supervisors, Lena shared valuable insights from her region.
- Carlos Castillo: An expert in environmental and land-use planning, Carlos brings a holistic perspective, especially regarding the Hawaiian Islands and Pacific Region.

Conclusion:

The session provided attendees with an in-depth understanding of the REPI program's potential in ensuring sustainable defense and conservation measures. Attendees left better equipped to envision how such partnerships can reshape communities, making them both secure and green.
