We have had a lot going on in our community relating to sustainability and taking care of our 'aina and our neighbors.

Hawaii has a goal to reach carbon net neutrality Councilmember | District 5 by 2045, something that the city supports 100%.

One collaborative initiative between the State, City, and energy stakeholders is the solar project in Mililani Agricultural Park that just went online, providing much needed energy as we move off coal.

Being mindful of how our actions affect the future of Oahu can help shape a better tomorrow. As I mentioned in last month's legislative highlights, the recent benchmarking bill will hopefully bring about more energy efficient practices, but Hawaii is already preparing for some of the negative effects of climate change. For example, Bill 41 (2022) addresses sea level rise, and looks to reduce future coastal hazards and protect and preserve the natural shoreline by increasing the required shoreline setback for future developments.

city legislative highlights:

- Bill 10: Many of the current LUO use regulations were adopted over 30 years ago. Since then, the General Plan, Development Plans, and Sustainable Community Plans have all been updated to reflect a more current vision for our island. The proposed amendments to the LUO align with these Plans and improve the readability of the document.
- Bill 41: The purpose of this ordinance is to update ROH Chapter 23, relating to shoreline setbacks, to incorporate amendments made by Act 16, Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, to HRS Chapter 205A, the State Coastal Zone Management law, and to implement an erosion-rate-based shoreline setback
- Bill 4: The purpose of this ordinance is to address the taxation of real property, particularly real property used as a transient accommodation. This is closely related to Ordinance 22-7, and addresses RPT for Bed and Breakfasts and Transient Vacation
- $\underline{\text{Resolution 22-194:}} \ \text{This resolution is to formalize the}$ caretaking rights and responsibilities for the Wai'oma'o slide area park to the Azama family in honor of the late Carol Azama. who cared for the parcel until her passing earlier this year.






Did You Know?

Along the Round Top slopes of Manoa Valley is Sonoma Street. Was the street named for Sonoma, the renowned wine-growing region in California, or perhaps someone with the surname Sonoma? The street was actually named in honor of a trans-oceanic steamer ship christened

Sonoma. The ship was commissioned, owned, and operated by the Oceanic Steamship Company.

ship. The screw steamer Pensacola (1859) was part of the U.S. Navy's Pacific Squadron from 1866-84, and regularly docked in Honolulu Harbor. From 1885-92, she cruised between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. In 1875, the Pensacola notably brought King Kalakaua back from San Francisco after a lengthy trip including meetings and receptions in Washington, D.C.

Makiki Park building's new life

The Department of Parks and Recreation and The United Korean Association of Hawaii (TUKAH) signed a two-year renewable lease between TUKAH and the Makiki District Park. TUKAH will renovate the existing Building 42 2nd and 3rd floors and public facilities for a proposed public library reading area, Korean language, exercise, music and other classes, and for civic events such as food drives, street clean-ups.

Bioeconomy Forum
